Photography could be seen as impossible for a blind or vision impaired person; this is absolutely not the case! With the assistance of the specially tailored holiday course, members with a passion for photography will discover that they can capture beautiful images.

The challenges are unique to each person. These challenges depend on the photographer's goals, ability and equipment. For most, the primary challenge centres on getting what they want to capture onto the camera. Another common challenge is reviewing their own work, and of course mobility – getting to where or what you want to shoot. On the photography holiday at the Sheffield centre, we will look at ways around these challenges, using modified tools, techniques and approaches.

Blind photographers do face substantial hurdles in becoming photographers. However, having the passion and desire to take pictures and capturing moments, means that picking up a camera and overcoming the challenges are worth it. Passion is the key.

Accommodation charges update 2013.

We remain committed to providing the best quality and range of services to our members. Our three centres are an integral part of service provision and in order to ensure we can continue to provide an excellent level of service, we employ an annual pricing review for our accommodation charges.

As with previous years, part of our dedication of responding to and meeting our members' needs, calls for the review of our accommodation charges at our centres. This review ensures we are still achieving viable operating costs for the organisation whilst allowing us to continually strive to provide and develop innovative services. Below are the new charges for our three centres in Brighton, Llandudno and Sheffield. These will be effective from 1st April 2013 and as you will see, the increases have been again kept to the absolute minimum.

In 2013 Sheffield will provide an additional six holiday/themed weeks and charges for these will be at the local Sheffield holiday rate.

Clubs using the centres will still be eligible for an accommodation discount in 2013, subject to certain terms and conditions. Clubs will receive further information regarding these.

Members staying at either Port Hall or Beacon Hill will be charged at the rates set out on the following pages.

Vision impaired archery and the Paralympics, by David Poyner, Chair of our Archery Club.

Prior to the London 2012 Paralympic games, I was asked by BBC Radio 4's In Touch programme what I thought of the inclusion of vision impaired (VI) archery in the Paralympics.

I replied that it wasn't.

That was the start of an amazing journey towards the possible inclusion of VI archery into the Paralympics.

I was invited to take part in a discussion on In Touch with Tom Dielen, General Secretary of World Archery, about how to get VI archery into the Paralympics.

The result of this positive discussion was that in August 2012, I met with Tom and others at Woolwich Barracks in South East London, the venue for Paralympic archery, to put my suggestions forward.

The meeting went very well and the assembled group liked my idea for the two categories to make VI archery a workable event for the games.

The plan is to get a group of archers and interested people to a seminar at Archery GB, Lilleshall, Shropshire in June/July 2013. The next step would be to hold a competition at the world championships in Beijing in November 2013.

If we have sufficient interest from around the world then who knows? Maybe and fingers crossed, the inclusion of VI archery in the Paralympics may happen in 2020.

Cooking with Constance Halford-Thompson.

Artist and Blind Veterans UK member, Constance Halford-Thompson, brings Review readers two simple to follow recipes. The first is for roast chicken with vegetables and the second is a safe way to roast potatoes.

"Firstly, buy some roasting bags as they are a wonderfully simple way to cook flavoursome food simply. Next take one roasting bag and put your pieces of chicken in. I use mostly rolled boned chicken thighs, but you can use any pieces. Pop them into the roasting bag and slice your vegetables, you could use leeks, carrots, onion — anything you feel like or have got in. Then add a little flour, some oil and lemon juice. Do up the bag tightly, but don't overfill it, leave a gap so there's plenty of air inside and make a small hole in the bag. Put it in a preheated oven at 180° , that's fan assisted, or gas mark 4, for about 25 to 30 minutes — and there you are.

"It's really tasty and there are quite a lot of juices in there. Sometimes I've added some cream or yoghurt, it's not essential, but both those ingredients can help. There's no washing up and it's delicious.

"I also have a simple recipe for potatoes, which are prepared with ease. Put some oil in an oven proof dish, use a flattish dish and make sure the oil covers the bottom. Cut some unpeeled potatoes into strips or knobs and dry them on a towel. You can also sprinkle a small amount of flour over them. Put them in the cold oil and turn them over so they are well coated and put them in a good hot oven for 30 minutes. It's far better than putting them into hot oil, as they are far less likely to splash hot oil at you."

Constance is a very talented artist, who honed her skills as an artist over four very successful decades. Her paintings are collected worldwide and she exhibited her work at the Osborne and Anna Mei Chadwick Gallery for 20 years. She has also published a book: Pastels, an unusual technique, which is available online from American Amazon, priced at \$15.

During WWII Constance served in the Women's Auxiliary Service of Burma (WASBs), when she took a mobile canteen to troops fighting in Burma. General Slim, who later became 1st Viscount Slim, Commander of the 14th Army, known as the 'Forgotten Army,' said of the WASBs: "They showed the highest standard of devotion and courage."

Friends Reunited - members reunions in the early years by Rob Baker, Collections and Archives.

These meetings have in fact taken place since soon after we were founded in 1915. Members may be interested to know of some of the activities that took place at them.

The first was at Bristol in 1920, and the number of meetings soon grew and spread throughout the country. For example in the first few months of 1927 there were meetings in Hull, Leeds, Sheffield, Hastings, Canterbury, Bedford and Reading. Further afield, the first meeting in Northern Ireland had taken place in Belfast in April 1925, with the first in the then Irish Free State taking place in Dublin in July of the same year.

It is striking to see how well-attended many of the meetings were. Every member in Northern Ireland came to the first Belfast reunion, and generally attendances of over 100 were not uncommon. They also show how important music was to the early members. The meetings often featured guest singers who would entertain with popular songs. A reunion at Preston in January 1925 is typical, featuring Mr Till of Lancaster who sang songs including 'The Crown of the Year' and 'The Border Ballad'. A meeting in Cardiff the following year had a harp soloist, and the one in Nottingham included a jazz band and dancing. The Review reported that 'it is surprising how many men find they can still dance in spite of not having had any practice since leaving St Dunstan's'. The dances in our headquarters in Regent's Park were very popular events, so it seems rather sad to think that members had not usually danced after they had left there.

Meetings often had other guest speakers too. Sometimes members of our Council were able to attend, and occasionally there were celebrities. The meeting at Exeter in 1925 was entertained by Albert J. Coles, who as 'Jan Stewer' was then a well-known writer, famous for his 'Devon dialect' stories. Competitions and games such as skittles were also popular, although it is now not always clear what was involved; for example, one meeting featured what is intriguingly described as a bun and needle race.

Of course, members would often be meeting up with others they had spent much time with in training and rehabilitation at our early centres. Occasionally these would be men whose involvement dated right back to our very beginnings. The meeting at Canterbury in 1927 was attended by Joseph Selby, who was one of the very first members at what was described at the meeting as 'the little red house in the Bayswater Road'. This was the original hostel which we occupied for a few weeks before moving to St Dunstan's Lodge in Regent's Park. Also present was Alfred Bennett, who had a link to our earliest days. He was reported as saying that when St Dunstan's first opened in the Bayswater Road he was the postman who delivered letters there twice daily, and little did he think that he would eventually become a St Dunstaner!

Reunions were not exclusively local in nature. There were regular reunions of officers, and later of deaf-blind members. There were also meetings of members engaged in particular occupations. A telephonists' reunion in December 1926 was attended by nearly 80, including Chairman lan Fraser. He was able to boost morale by reporting on success for those engaged in this line of work; of 115 men who had been trained for this employment, only seven were then not in employment.

Other particular groups followed in later years. Women's reunions began in 1963, following on from the first major influx of women members from the Second World War. However the culmination of reunion activities in our early years undoubtedly came in 1935, when special reunions also celebrated the Silver Jubilee of King George V. Meetings were held all over the United Kingdom and in the Irish Free State. The largest was the Home Counties reunion, which was held in the Royal Albert Hall in the presence of the Prince of Wales. Over 500 members and their escorts attended.

The opportunities the meetings afforded to Blind Veterans UK members were clearly very much valued by members, as we know they are today. This could not better be summed up than by our former postman: Bennett also emphasised the importance of the meetings, pointing out what pleasure they gave to the men and their families and stating that it was the explicit desire of their late Chief – Sir Arthur Pearson – that they should meet together once a year and discuss how they were getting on, and he considered these meetings were a very big asset and bond of union.

At the Trustees meeting in December 2012, Trustees Air Vice Marshal Richard Kyle CB MBE and Dave Stuttard MBE stood down at the end of their term of office. We would like to thank them very publicly for their many years of outstanding service to Blind Veterans UK. We also bring the sad news of the death of Trustee David Knowles CBE in 2012. David gave 15 years of loyal support to Blind Veterans UK and he is missed by his fellow Trustees and members and staff who knew him.

Tim Bacon stepped down as Vice Chairman at the end of his term of office, but will remain a Trustee. Tim Davis was appointed Vice Chairman. New Trustees welcomed to the Board are: Kerry Levins and Paul Palmer, who are both members of Blind Veterans UK. They are joined by Air Vice Marshal Paul Luker CB OBE AFC DL and Rear Admiral Stephen Meyer. To introduce you to them we include short profiles.

Kerry Levins

Kerry Levins is a former Army Officer who Served in the Royal Corps of Signals for 10 years, leaving the Service in 1999 as a Captain. He served in Hong Kong, Brunei, Europe, Great Britain and the United States of America.

On Leaving the Army, Kerry has worked in the IT sector, initially for Redstone Communications plc, a small Telecommunications provider. In 2006 Kerry was registered blind as a result of Ischaemic Retinal Vasculitis, a degenerative condition of the blood vessels in the eye, which has subsequently been attributed to his Army Service. In 2007 Kerry was sought out and offered employment by BP plc, where he continues to work within IT, specialising in IT Infrastructure Library.

On becoming a member of Blind Veterans UK and a guide dog owner in 2010, Kerry has involved himself, whenever possible, in fundraising activities for the two organisations, which have in his own words "changed my life". He hopes by becoming a Trustee he will be able to actively help improve the lives of other former Service personnel affected by sight loss; he intends to focus specifically on the areas of rehabilitation and employment. Kerry lives in Aldershot with his wife, who is a Personal Trainer, their young daughter, Kerry's guide dog Pedro and the recent addition of two cats.

Paul Palmer

Paul Palmer has been a member of Blind Veterans UK for two years.

He was commissioned from the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst in 1972 into the Royal Corps of Transport before it reformed into the Royal Logistic Corps.

Most of his career was spent in the movement of personnel, equipment and ammunition around the world by road, rail, sea and air. He also spent time working in Headquarters United Kingdom Land Forces, Ministry of Defence Main Building and RAF High Wycombe in staff appointments. He spent two tours of duty in Northern Ireland in 1973 and 1975 and Served in the Gulf during the first Gulf War. On leaving the Army in 2002 as a Major he spent the next seven years working in the Middle East in a variety of appointments before retiring in 2009. He was diagnosed as blind in March 2010.

Outside Blind Veterans UK he is a keen follower of his local rugby team, Chippenham and England, enjoys walking his Jack Russell, being with his family and grandchildren, listening to books and chatting and enjoying a drink with friends. He lives in North Colerne, North Wiltshire, with his wife Pauline who is a retired teacher. They have three grown up children and three grandchildren.

During his time with Blind Veterans UK he has completed several computer courses, a chair caning course, a willow weaving course and he has taken up blind archery.

Air Vice-Marshal Paul Luker CB OBE AFC DL

Paul joined the RAF in 1968 aged 17, Serving until 2006. He trained as a support helicopter pilot and subsequently his flying duties ranged across a wide number of RAF and Army helicopters. His operational service included time in Northern Ireland, the Gulf, the Balkans and Belize; his final tour, following three years in command of the Joint Helicopter Command, was as Deputy Commander of the US-led coalition in Afghanistan. Since 2006 he has been chief executive of the Council of Reserve Forces' and Cadets' Associations (RFCA). The RFCAs provide regional support to the Reserves of all three Services and to their Cadet movements, as well as maintaining a vital linkage between the Armed Forces and civilian communities.

Away from work Paul is a DL for Hampshire and is increasingly immersed in county based activities, not least as President of the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Cadets. What time is left is taken up with an interest in military history, walking, food, wine and other sedentary pursuits; to call his golf 'mediocre' is a criminal overstatement.

Rear Admiral Stephen Meyer

Stephen Meyer Served in the Royal Navy for 34 years, when he specialised as a navigator, Serving in several ships in that role, including during the Falklands conflict in 1982. He commanded six warships, ranging from the Omani fast patrol boat SNV Al Mansur during the Dhofar campaign, to the aircraft carrier HMS Illustrious. Stephen's shore appointments included the running of professional training of junior officers, the Director of Maritime Intelligence, and the Director of Naval Plans. As a Rear Admiral, Stephen Served as the Military Adviser to the High Representative in Bosnia Herzegovina; he was the Commander UK Maritime Forces (the Navy's seagoing Admiral); and in his final job in the Navy, Stephen oversaw the deployment of all UK forces overseas, including those in Bosnia, Kosovo, FYROM (the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia), Sierra Leone, the Gulf region and, post 9/11, Afghanistan.

From 2002 to 2010, Stephen was the UK's Chief Inspector of Marine Accidents. As the head of the Marine Accident Investigation Branch (MAIB), he was responsible for investigating accidents and incidents to or onboard UK vessels anywhere in the world, and vessels of any nationality within UK waters. The purpose of MAIB investigations is solely to enhance future safety, and the investigations do not attribute blame or apportion liability; although the MAIB is funded by the UK Government, Stephen was statutorily independent of Government and all other vested interests.

Since retiring from the MAIB, Stephen has been involved in voluntary work with a number of charities. He also serves as one of the four members of an international 'Panel of Experts', established to advise the cruise line industry in the wake of the loss of the Costa Concordia.

Stephen lives with his wife in West Sussex and they have two daughters and two granddaughters.

Colin Williamson's Beer of the Month

Wadworth Swordfish.

This is a most unusual and unique beer as it contains Pussers Rum from the British Virgin Islands. The British Navy's association with rum goes all the way back to 1665 and this beer was brewed to commemorate 100 years of naval aviation, as the beer is named after the WWII Fairey Swordfish torpedo bomber, as depicted on the label. It pours a nice bronze colour with a decent off white head and the nose is of rum, sweet malts and toffee. There is a pleasant fruity raisin flavour, which I assume is from the rum, and it has a nice smooth mouthfeel to it. There is a hint of bitter hoppiness in the finish but not powerful enough to outweigh the malts. Overall, I found this a pleasant beer and very drinkable, coming in at a modest 5% ABV. The Fairey Swordfish operated primarily as a fleet attack aircraft and one of its claims to fame is that it was involved in the crippling of the German battleship the Bismarck during a battle in the Atlantic Ocean two days after the Bismarck had sunk the British Battlecruiser HMS Hood.

William 'Bill' Anderson, Black Watch Royal Highland Regiment

William 'Bill' Anderson of Romford, Essex died on 27th December 2012, aged 92. He joined the Black Watch in 1941. He Served in Tunisia and Italy, following a gunshot wound in his arm at Monte Cassino he was medically discharged in 1945.

Richard 'Gordon' Aston, Royal Air Force

Richard 'Gordon' Aston of Buckingham, Bucks died on 5th December 2012, aged 89. From 1943 to 1947 he Served in the RAF in the UK and France as an Air Gunner, flying in Wellington, Anson and Mitchell Bombers. He was discharged as a Warrant Officer.

Arthur 'Ralph' Atkinson, Royal Engineers, Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers

Arthur 'Ralph' Atkinson died on 29th November 2012, aged 92. He joined the Royal Engineers in 1940 and was commissioned in the REME on its creation in October 1942. He Served in North Africa and Italy before discharge as a Captain in 1946.

Raymond Bedford, Coldstream Guards

Raymond Bedford of Middlesbrough, Cleveland died on 16th November 2012, aged 83. He joined the Coldstream Guards in 1947, Serving in Libya, Egypt, Palestine, Cyprus and Malta. He completed his full time Service in 1953 and Colours Service in 1959.

Jack Blane, Royal Army Medical Corps, British Expeditionary Force

Jack Blane of Bedford, Beds died on 8th December 2012, aged 94. Joining the RAMC in 1939 he went to France and Belgium with the BEF and was evacuated from Dunkirk in June 1940. He was later posted to Beirut and Egypt. He fought in North Africa with the 8th Army, pausing in Malta before the Sicily and Italy invasions. He returned to England and landed at Normandy two days after D-Day. He was discharged in 1946 as a Lance Corporal.

Robert Booth, General Service Corps, Green Howards, North Staffordshire Regiment (the Prince of Wales's), South Staffordshire Regiment, Sherwood Foresters

Robert Booth of Middlesbrough, Cleveland died on 30th November 2012, aged 87. He joined the General Service Corps in 1944, transferring to the Green Howards. He later joined the Sherwood Foresters and was posted to India, visiting Bombay, Agra, Ranchi and Calcutta. He transferred to the North Staffs in 1946 and the South Staffs in 1947. He was demobilised in 1947.

Victor Bratt, Royal Artillery, British Expeditionary Force

Victor Bratt of Ulverston, Cumbria died on 8th January 2013, aged 93. He Served with the Royal Artillery from 1939 to 1946 and with the 56 A/T Regiment attached to the 51st Highland Division he went to France with the BEF. He was evacuated from Dunkirk. He was subsequently posted to India and Burma for four years and reached Rangoon. He was discharged as a Sergeant.

Oswald Brown, Royal Engineers

Oswald Brown of Exeter died on 15th December 2012, aged 82. From 1948 to 1950 he Served in the Royal Engineers as a General Field Engineer. He was discharged as a Sapper in 1950.

Thomas 'Tom' Christie, Royal Army Medical Corps, Seaforth Highlanders (Ross-Shire Buffs the Duke of Albany), Corps of Military Police

On return to England he joined the Advanced Flying Unit and qualified as a night fighter navigator on Mosquitoes. He was posted to India and Ceylon before discharge in 1947 as a Flight Sergeant.

Leslie Hammond, Royal Signals

Leslie Hammond of Solihull, West Midlands died on 22nd November 2012, aged 82. From 1948 to 1950 he Served in the Royal Signals for National Service. He worked indirectly for MI5 as a Morse code operator. His unit was stationed in Austria at a listening post close to the Soviet border.

Herbert 'Bert' Jenkins of Newhaven, East Sussex died on 10th December 2012, aged 95. He joined the London Irish Rifles (TA) in 1938, becoming a regular in 1939. He spoke Swahili and Served in Africa with the Kings African Rifles in Kenya & Malawi. He also Served in Burma, India and Ceylon before discharge in 1959.

Cecil 'Jim' Johnson of Brigg, South Humberside died on 25th November 2012, aged 88. He joined the RAF in 1942 and was an Air Gunner in Lancaster, Halifax and Sterling Bombers. Based at RAF Grimsby he successfully completed 31 operations. He later moved to India in the stores department and was based in Lahore. He was demobilised as a Sergeant in 1947.

Henry Kerfoot, Royal Artillery and Royal Army Service Corps

Henry Kerfoot of Chorley, Lancs died on 5th January 2013, aged 93. He initially

Served in the UK before joining the RASC. He took part in the D-Day Landings, moving through France to Holland. He was discharged in 1947 as a Lance Corporal.

Wesley Kilpin, Royal Air Force

Wesley Kilpin of Southampton, Hants died on 23rd December 2012, aged 89. He Served in the Royal Air Force from 1941 to 1945.

Helen Lake, Women's Auxiliary Air Force

Helen Lake of Arundel, West Sussex died on 4th December 2012, aged 90. From 1942 until 1944 she Served in the WAAF. Specialising as a staff car driver with 4MT Company, she drove for the Air Ministry in London and combined operations personnel.

Alan 'Ned' Larkin, General Service Corps, Royal Army Service Corps

Alan 'Ned' Larkin of Horsham, West Sussex died on 1st December 2012, aged 83. He joined the General Service Corps in 1947 for National Service and was transferred to the RASC a month later. He contracted river blindness whilst Serving in the Korean War. He was discharged in 1952 as a driver.

Thomas Latham MM, Royal Army Ordnance Corps

Thomas Latham MM of Billingham, Cleveland died on 15th December 2012, aged 92. He joined the RAOC in 1940 and joined the 1st/7th Battalion The Middlesex Regiment, a machine gun battalion. Seconded to the Black Watch he Served in the Western Desert. He took part in the invasion of Sicily and Italy. Later deployed on D+2, landing at Sword Beach, he was wounded on 8th August. He was awarded the Military Medal at Chateau Breville before discharge as a Private in 1945.

David Lester-George, Coldstream Guards

David Lester-George of Wymondham, Norfolk died on 30th November 2012, aged 71. He Served in the Coldstream Guards from 1960 to 1966, in the UK, East Africa, South America, Germany and the Middle East, leaving as a Guardsman in 1966.

Olive 'Medora' Heseltine, Women's Royal Naval Service

Olive 'Medora' Heseltine of Romsey, Hants died on 17th November 2012, aged 97. From 1941 to 1945 she Served in the Wrens, as a Duty Commander's writer,

George Rushmore of Reigate, Surrey died on 16th December 2012, aged 100. He joined the Royal Artillery in 1940 and was commissioned in 1942, joining the Royal Army Service Corps. He Served in the Middle East, Tripoli, and Egypt before discharge as a Major in March 1946.

Timothy Ryan, Royal Artillery

Timothy Ryan of Liverpool died on 2nd December 2012, aged 94. He joined the Royal Artillery in 1940 and was attached to an anti aircraft battery. He was deployed to Egypt and then to Tobruk, wounded and made a prisoner of war. He was transferred to a hospital in Italy and was later sent to Germany. He was medically discharged in 1945.

Keith Seaward, Royal Air Force

Keith Seaward of Seaton, Devon died on 22nd December 2012, aged 91. He joined the RAF in 1940 and Served as a pilot until 1945. He trained on Tiger Moths and Served in Canada, where he flew a Sterman. In America he flew a Kingfisher and a Catalina. On return to the UK he became second pilot on a Sunderland Flying Boat and was involved with North Atlantic Convoy Escort. He transferred to Nigeria and was based in Lagos protecting convoys from South Africa.

Frank Sewell, Royal Navy

Frank Sewell of Gillingham, Kent died on 26th August 2012, aged 93. From 1934 he Served across the globe in the Royal Navy, notably in the Pacific and Mediterranean. He briefly served on HMS Hood and possibly on every vessel type from MTB to battleships before discharge as a Chief Electrician in 1959.

Allen Shorter, Royal Air Force

Allen Shorter of Brighton, East Sussex died on 24th December 2012, aged 87. He joined the RAF in 1943, specialising as a radar technician. He Served in the UK and India in Bombay, Poona, Karachi, Calcutta and Bengal before discharge as a Leading Aircraftman in 1947.

Roy Smith, General Service Corps, Royal Armoured Corps, Reconnaissance Corps

Roy Smith of Woodthorpe, Nottingham died on 9th November 2012, aged 88. In 1942 following a month's training with the General Service Corps he joined the RAC. Later transferring to the Reconnaissance Corps. He was discharged as a Sergeant in 1947.

Gordon Slater, Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire Regiment, Royal Military Police

Gordon Slater of Luton, Beds died on 5th December 2012, aged 91. From 1945

to 1948 he Served in the Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire Regiment as a Lance Corporal. He was posted to India where he transferred to the Royal Military Police, before being posted to Palestine.

Frank Staton General Service Corps, Cameronians (Scottish Rifles), Corps of Military Police

He was deployed to France just after D-Day and moved through to the Kiel Canal area in Germany. Stanley Stone of Potters Bar, Herts died on 6th January 2013, aged 91. A Royal Navy Volunteer he was mobilised in August 1939. He served on HMS Achates and HMS Warspite, earning the Pacific Star, Italy Star, Atlantic Star and Africa Star. He also Served in the Arctic Convoys and received the Malta Medal.

William 'Tony' Stone, Royal Army Medical Corps, Royal Artillery

William 'Tony' Stone of Sheffield, South Yorkshire died on 20th December 2012, aged 78. He completed his National Service in the RAMC from 1952 to 1954. He enjoyed the Army so transferred to the Royal Artillery (TA) and was attached to the Parachute Regiment in Germany. He completed his TA Service in 1958.

Benjamin Temple, Royal Signals

Benjamin Temple of Peterhead, Aberdeenshire died on 27th December 2012, aged 91. He Served in the Royal Signals with the 21st Army Group Signals from 1941 to 1945. He was wounded in action in Germany in a mine explosion on 16th March 1945. He was transferred to our ward at Stoke Mandeville Hospital and later to Church Stretton. He trained as a Physiotherapist.

David Thomas, Merchant Navy

David Thomas of Pontardawe, Swansea died on 27th December 2012, aged 88. From 1941 he Served in the Merchant Navy as a radio operator. He served in the Atlantic and Pacific theatres in various ships including the Lucellum, Bury and Beresford. He received a letter of commendation from the Director of Marconi International in 1945, prompted by a letter from Admiral Sir Max Horton, Commander in Chief for the Western Approaches for the excellent

work done by Merchant Navy radio operators during the battle of the Atlantic. He was discharged in 1945.

Frederick Thomas, Royal Artillery and Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers

Frederick Thomas of Swindon, Wiltshire died on 5th December 2012, aged 96. He Served in the Royal Artillery from 1932 as part of the 220 Battery and 112 Field Regiment in the 43rd Wessex Division. He landed in France on D+6 and moved through France to Belgium, Holland and Germany. In 1946 he transferred to the REME, Serving until 1956, leaving as a Company Sergeant Major.

George Thompson, Royal Navy

George Thompson of Buxton, Derbyshire died on 27th December 2012, aged 94. From 1940 he Served in the Royal Navy in 1940 and became a Signaller. He Served onboard Clan Fraser, bound for Malta where he remained for a few years. He then joined the minesweeper HMS Eddy and having been blown up he joined a new Motor Launch base. He was later involved in the invasion of Sicily, Salerno and Normandy on HMS Hillary, a Headquarters landing ship. He later joined the frigate HMS Loch Tarbet on anti-submarine duty before spending time in Ceylon, Malaysia and Java. He was discharged in 1946 as a Yeoman of Signals.

William 'Bill' Tomson, Royal Hampshire Regiment

William 'Bill' Tomson of Crawley, West Sussex died on 17th December 2012, aged 95. He joined the Hampshire Regiment in 1936. He went to Palestine, where he was deafened in an incident, then to India in 1937. In 1938 he went to Sudan and was abroad throughout the war. He joined Lt/Col Young's Army and fought at Maleme, Crete, where he was captured. He was sent to a German PoW camp and escaped. He was subsequently recaptured and went on to study agriculture in another camp. He was discharged in 1946 as a Lance Sergeant.

Morgan Truscott, Royal Air Force

Morgan Truscott of Lingfield Crescent, South East London died on 9th December 2012, aged 91. From 1941 he Served in the RAF as an aircraft electrician. He was posted to 209 Squadron, a Catalina Flying Boat Unit and subsequently to Mombasa, East Africa. He was sent on a variety of

detachments to cover the submarine threat in the Indian Ocean. He completed his Service in 1946, leaving as a Leading Aircraftman.
